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CHAPTER ONE

ONE MAN, ONE MISSION

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

God's power transforms a life through surrender, leading to salvation, freedom, and a mission to reach others, as revealed through His promise of life, truth, victory, and restoration.

SCRIPTURE USED IN THIS CHAPTER

- Daniel 12:3
- 1 Thessalonians 2:19 (implied reference: “What is our hope or joy...”)
- Proverbs 14:12
- Proverbs 16:25
- 1 John 4:4
- Isaiah 35:3–6

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

The cited Scriptures reveal that God rewards those who lead others to righteousness (Daniel 12:3), and that people themselves are the fruit of ministry (1 Thessalonians 2:19). They warn that human reasoning apart from God leads to death (Proverbs 14:12; 16:25), while affirming that God's power within believers is greater than any force in the world (1 John 4:4). Isaiah 35:3–6 shows God's saving work—bringing strength, healing, and restoration—demonstrating His desire to rescue and transform lives.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

1. According to Proverbs 14:12 and 16:25, how can a person be misled in their own thinking about life and truth?
2. What does 1 John 4:4 reveal about the power available to believers?
3. How does Isaiah 35:3–6 describe the results of God's salvation and intervention?
4. What does Daniel 12:3 teach about the eternal value of leading others to righteousness?
5. How does this chapter illustrate the difference between knowing about God and surrendering to Him?

GROUP DISCUSSION

1. Why do you think people can have many opportunities to know God but still miss Him?
2. How does the reality of “a way that seems right” (Proverbs) apply in modern life?
3. What does it look like, practically, to believe that “greater is He that is in you”?
4. How should the promise of God’s restoring power (Isaiah 35) shape how we view broken situations?
5. In what ways can a transformed life become a testimony that impacts others?

PRAYER & SPIRITUAL ACTIVATION

Prayer

Lord Jesus, I come before You acknowledging that Your ways are higher than mine. Where I have followed what “seemed right” in my own understanding, I repent. You are the way, the truth, and the life. Thank You for Your power that is greater than anything in this world. Strengthen my heart, just as Your Word says. Remove fear, restore what is broken, and bring healing where there is weakness. Use my life to lead others to righteousness so that Your glory may shine through me. I surrender fully to You—my thoughts, my will, and my path. Amen.

Activation Step

Identify one area of your life where you’ve been relying on your own understanding (Proverbs 14:12). Surrender it to God today in prayer and choose one practical step of obedience aligned with His truth.

CHAPTER TWO

WHAT IS FAITH?

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

Faith is trusting in God's love, revealed through Jesus, and expressed through belief that results in action and participation in His works.

SCRIPTURE USED IN THIS CHAPTER

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

The Scriptures show that faith is rooted in knowing and trusting God's nature, which is love (1 John 4:7–12). Jesus reveals the Father's will through His words and actions (John 14:9; 8:29), demonstrating that God is willing to heal, restore, and act (Matthew 8:1–3; Mark 1:41–42). Faith is not passive—it is belief that leads to action (James 2:14–22). When we understand God's love, fear is removed and confidence in Him grows (1 John 4:16–18), enabling us to trust His promises and act accordingly.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

1. According to 1 John 4:7–12, what does it mean that “God is love,” and how does that shape your faith?
2. How does Jesus' response in Matthew 8:1–3 answer the question of God's willingness?

CHAPTER THREE

WHAT IS MINISTRY?

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

Ministry is the outflow of what God has done in a person's life—sharing His work, love, and power with others through obedience and action.

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

The story in Mark 5:1–20 shows that ministry begins with transformation—what Jesus does in a person becomes their message. Jesus instructs the delivered man to testify, revealing that ministry is sharing God's work with others. Believers are called to freely give what they have received (Matthew 10:8), and God Himself works within them to fulfill His purpose (Philippians 2:13). Ministry is empowered by God's gifts (1 Corinthians 7:7) and grows through faithful use (Matthew 13:12). The Gospel message includes healing, salvation, and restoration through Jesus (Isaiah 53:4–5; Matthew 8:17; Romans 10:13), and is meant to be proclaimed to all people (Mark 16:15).

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

1. In Mark 5:1–20, what did Jesus tell the delivered man to do, and what does that reveal about ministry?
2. How does Matthew 10:8 shape your understanding of giving what you have received from God?
3. What does Philippians 2:13 teach about God’s role in your calling and ministry?
4. How do the healing and salvation Scriptures (Isaiah 53:4–5; Matthew 8:17) influence how you view helping others?
5. What does Matthew 13:12 reveal about using what God has given you?

GROUP DISCUSSION

1. Why is personal testimony such a powerful form of ministry?
2. How can someone who is not a “preacher” still fulfill ministry according to this chapter?
3. What are some obstacles that keep people from sharing what God has done in their lives?
4. How does understanding that God works through us (Philippians 2:13) change how we approach serving others?
5. What practical ways can we “go into all the world” (Mark 16:15) in everyday life?

PRAYER & SPIRITUAL ACTIVATION

Prayer

Lord Jesus, thank You for what You have done in my life. You have saved me, restored me, and shown me Your mercy. Help me to understand that my life is not just for me, but that You desire to work through me. Give me boldness to share what You have done. Teach me to freely give what I have freely received. Work in me and through me according to Your will. Use my words, my actions, and my life to reflect Your love and power to others. Amen.

Activation Step

Share your personal story of what God has done in your life with at least one person this week—keeping the focus on His work and His impact.

CHAPTER FOUR

THE KEY INGREDIENT

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

Faith—expressed through belief, authority in Jesus’ name, and action—is essential for experiencing and demonstrating God’s power.

The Gospel itself carries God’s power (Romans 1:16), and faith requires believing before seeing (Mark 11:24). Jesus consistently instructed people to act on their faith (Luke 17:14; John 9:7), showing that obedience and action are essential components of living faith.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

1. What does Mark 11:24 teach about believing before seeing results?
2. How did Jesus demonstrate authority in healing situations (e.g., Mark 10:46–52; John 11:43)?

3. What role does action play in faith according to Luke 17:14 and John 9:7?
4. How does Romans 1:16 shape your confidence in the Gospel message?

CHAPTER FIVE

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

God transforms individuals through salvation so that His life, power, and purpose can flow through them to others.

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

Christ dwelling within believers is the source of hope and power (Colossians 1:27). God's grace overcomes sin (Romans 5:20), and His light overcomes darkness (John 1:5; 1 John 1:5). Believers are called to overcome evil with good (Romans 12:21) and to function together with diverse gifts for one unified purpose (1 Corinthians 12:1–13).

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

3. What does it mean that “Christ is in you” (Colossians 1:27)?

GROUP DISCUSSION

1. How does personal transformation become a testimony to others?

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

These Scriptures reveal that the true enemy is Satan, whose works Jesus came to destroy (1 John 3:8). Believers do not fight with natural weapons but with spiritual authority (2 Corinthians

10:4). Through Jesus' death and resurrection, the power of darkness has been defeated (Colossians 2:13–15), and believers now live in victory and salvation (Romans 8:37; Hebrews 5:9). Salvation includes deliverance, protection, and restoration (Hebrews 2:3–4; 1 Thessalonians 5:8–10). By submitting to God and resisting the devil (James 4:7), believers walk in the authority given through Christ, who has overcome death and holds all power (Revelation 1:17–18).
