CORE BIBLICAL THEME

God created all things good, humanity fell into brokenness through sin, and redemption is found through Christ, who restores the path back to God and reframes how we process all of life's transitions.

SCRIPTURE USED IN THIS CHAPTER

- Genesis 1–3
- Genesis 3:1–24
- John 14:1–6
- Luke 23:32–43

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

Genesis 1–3 establishes that God created the world good, but sin introduced brokenness, distorting humanity's relationship with God and ability to live rightly. Genesis 3:1–24 shows how disobedience led to separation and consequences, yet God continued to pursue humanity.

John 14:1–6 reveals that Jesus is the only way back to the Father, providing the solution to humanity's separation. Luke 23:32–43 demonstrates that even in the final moments of life, faith in Jesus brings restoration and the promise of Paradise.

PIVOT WITH PURPOSE FREE RESOURCE BIBLE STUDY

Together, these passages show a clear movement: from creation to fall, and from brokenness to redemption through Christ. This framework defines how every transition in life can be understood and processed.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

1. What do Genesis 1–3 reveal about God’s original design and humanity’s fall into brokenness?
2. How does Genesis 3:1–24 describe the consequences of sin and God’s response to it?
3. What does Jesus’ statement in John 14:1–6 reveal about the way back to God?
4. How does the response of the second thief in Luke 23:32–43 demonstrate faith and repentance?
5. How do these passages together shape your understanding of life’s changes and spiritual direction?

GROUP DISCUSSION

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

Faith is trust in God that shapes how we live, is demonstrated through obedience, and grows over time through ongoing transformation.

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

Romans 4:13–25 shows that faith involves trusting God’s promises even when circumstances seem impossible. Abraham’s life in Genesis 12:1–9 and 22:1–18 demonstrates that faith requires obedience, trust, and surrender, even without full understanding.

James 1:22–27 and 2:14–26 teach that genuine faith is active and expressed through obedience, not merely belief. Romans 3:23 reminds us that all fall short, yet faithfulness is marked by returning to God rather than perfection.

Ephesians 6:12 reveals that faith is lived out amid spiritual struggle, while Philippians 1:6 affirms that God continues His work in believers. Matthew 16:13–28 and Proverbs 24:16 show that faith develops over time, often through correction, failure, and perseverance.

Together, these passages reveal that faith is both foundational and formative—it begins with trust in God and matures through ongoing obedience and transformation.

CORE BIBLICAL THEME

Believers are defined by their identity in God—created in His image, adopted as His children, and shaped by His truth rather than performance or external validation.

- Galatians 4:4–7

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

Ephesians 1:3–14 reveals that believers are chosen, adopted, redeemed, and sealed by God,

establishing identity as something given by Him. Matthew 3:17 shows that identity is rooted in relationship with God before any action or performance.

Romans 8:14–17 and Galatians 4:4–7 teach that believers are adopted as children of God, no longer living for approval but from acceptance. Ephesians 2:10 affirms that this identity leads to purposeful living.

Genesis 1:26–27 and Psalm 139:13–14 show that humans are created intentionally in God’s image. James 1:23–24 highlights the importance of seeing ourselves rightly through God’s truth rather than forgetting our identity.

Romans 8:1, Isaiah 45:3, Matthew 26:28, and 2 Corinthians 4:16 reinforce that through Christ there is no condemnation, forgiveness is given, and renewal is ongoing.

Together, these Scriptures establish that identity is not earned or defined by external factors but is rooted in God’s creation, redemption, and ongoing work in the believer.

BIBLICAL INSIGHT

Exodus 3:1–12 shows that God calls His people in unexpected moments, revealing His purpose even in disruption. Joseph’s story in Genesis 37, 39, and 41 demonstrates that God works through hardship, injustice, and delay to fulfill His plans.

Psalm 27:14 teaches the necessity of waiting on the Lord with strength and trust. Isaiah 55:8–9 reminds us that God’s ways and thoughts are higher than human understanding, especially when plans change. Proverbs 16:9 affirms that while people make plans, God ultimately directs their steps.

CORE BIBLICAL THEME
